The Fenton High School boys varsity soccer team (pictured above) won the IHSA Class 2A Regional Championship after defeating Burlington Central 1 - 0. In the semi-regional competition, Fenton beat Kaneland 4 - 1. The team moves on to semi-sectional competition.

On Saturday, October 24, Jose Perez-Vazquez finished in first place at the IHSA Class 2A Boys Cross Country Regional Championship. Top finishers for the girls cross country team were Jessica McCauley (4) and Marisol Garcia (5). Both teams qualified for IHSA Class 2A Sectionals.

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Jose Vazquez-Perez finished in first place at the IHSA Class 2A conference and regional competition. The boys team finished second in conference and regionals.



Marisol Garcia finished fifth and Jessica McCauley fourth at the IHSA Class 2A girls cross country meet. Girls varsity finished fifth in conference and fourth at regionals.

A Note from the Principal

Where are the Missing Advanced Placement (AP) Students?

Every year, an estimated 640,000 bright American high school students are excluded from AP classes due to tracking that steers students toward less rigorous coursework. This practice affects these students' college and career choices, earning potential and fulfillment. This practice contributes to widening of the advance placement gap in our country. We need to close this gap and end this practice. The questions are: Why aren't these students taking these challenging AP classes? How do we identify these bright students? And once we identified them, how do we support them?

I am excited to announce that Fenton High School has been selected as one of 120 schools to participate in the Equal Opportunity School (EOS) initiative. EOS is a non-profit, data-driven organization committed to narrowing the advance placement gap described above. In the coming months, Fenton will partner with EOS in identifying, recruiting and retaining these missing AP students. The identification process includes collecting and analyzing student test scores and teacher and student surveys. Recruitment includes but not limited to meeting with individual students and their parents, and the retention process focuses on supporting students once they enroll in their desired AP classes. We should see our AP enrollment increase in the 2016 - 2017 school year.

AP students are significantly more likely to graduate from high school, succeed in entry level college classes, graduate from college, have a higher grade point average in college and earn more college credits compared to their non-AP peers. In addition to these findings, we want our Fenton students to challenge themselves and take college courses before they go to college. As a father of five children, I expect all of my kids to go to college. I want my kids to take AP classes so they can experience the rigor of college courses and to see how successful they are. I believe Fenton parents want the same for their children.

College and Career Corner

It's Okay to Be Undecided

One of the biggest discussions with students in my office is what their prospective major and career plans are. More often than not students tell me they have no idea what they want to do, but they know they want to go to college. They will also often share that their family is uncertain about having them attend a four year school if they don't know what they want to do yet. What they don't realize is that they are in good company in feeling this way. Up to 50 percent of high school seniors nationwide are undecided each year, and research shows that up to 70 percent of students will change their major at least once while in college.

While it is scary to think about sending your child away to college and paying for college if they are still undecided about their major, I want to assure you that this is common and that these students can still be very successful with their collegiate studies and graduate within four years. It is also highly likely that your son or daughter is not truly undecided, but rather still deciding. Students know what subjects they like and dislike. They know whether they like working individually or as a group. They know whether they love speaking in front of people or prefer to work behind the scenes. They know whether or not they love to write and research or if they are strong at working with numbers and prefer analytical logical tasks. What they do not yet know is how these personal attributes and strengths translate into a college major and later a future career. In addition to talking with their counselor in high school and their academic advisor in college, taking college courses will help them to figure this out. Most students have not been exposed to everything that is available to them. We do not have an anthropology, gender studies or the extensive course catalog available at colleges here at Fenton. There is so much their minds have yet to be exposed to so it makes sense that they are currently unsure or may later change their mind.

Most seniors are seventeen while they are applying to college, and while we want them to have direction, it is still early for them to have the rest of their lives figured out. It is okay if they are undecided or rather, still deciding. College is both an academically and socially transformative experience that along with your support will help them get on the path to both their major and career.

Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) Parent Connection

During the month of November, Fenton's SEL program will focus on "How to Help a Friend in Need." More specifically, we will focus on developing the skill of empathy and providing information on suicide prevention. Students will be given information on how to find help for themselves or their friends if they are feeling depressed or suicidal. Students will be given a card that they can give to a friend or adult if they need help (see below).

However, those who know their children best and can offer early intervention in these unfortunate situations are parents. Tragically, suicide is the third leading cause of death among youth between 10 and 19 years of age. These heartbreaking deaths can be prevented if parents, educators, and students know the warning signs of suicide and intervene early. According to the National Association for School Psychologists (NASP), these risk factors and warning signs include:

- Mental illness including depression, conduct disorders, and substance abuse.
- Family stress/dysfunction.
- Environmental risks, including presence of a firearm in the home. Situational crises (i.e., traumatic death of a loved one, physical or sexual abuse, family violence, etc.).
- Suicidal threats in the form of direct and indirect statements.
- Suicide notes and plans.
- Prior suicidal behavior.
- Making final arrangements (e.g., making funeral arrangements, writing a will, giving away prized possessions).
- Preoccupation with death.
- Changes in behavior, appearance, thoughts and/or feelings.

The NASP recommends that parents take the following steps if they suspect their child is contemplating suicide:

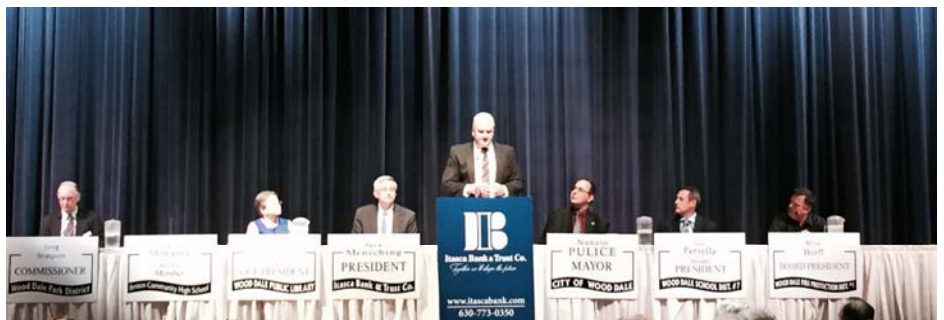
- Remain calm.
 - Ask the youth directly if he or she is thinking about suicide.
 - Focus on your concern for their wellbeing and avoid being accusatory.
 - Listen.
 - Reassure them that there is help and they will not feel like this forever.
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- Do not judge.
 - Provide constant supervision. Do not leave the youth alone.
 - Remove means for self-harm.
 - Get help: Parents should seek help from school or community mental health resources as soon as possible.
