Taken from the popular novel by Bel Kaufman, *Up the Down Staircase* is the story of Sylvia Barrett, a first year English teacher at an inner city school with hopes of inspiring students to become writers and peeking their interest in classical literature. However, she quickly learns that this noble pursuit will have a number of obstacles from students and administration alike. Written in 1964, *Up the Down Staircase* spent 64 weeks on the New York Times Best Seller list and sold over 6 million copies. As a play, it is one of the most produced high school plays of all time, providing students with a number of memorable roles and audiences with as many laughs. Mark your calendar for Fenton's production which promises to be a wonderful evening of entertainment.

Stop Hunger Initiative

September was Hunger Action Month and the Northern Illinois Food Pantry asked everyone to "Go Orange" on September 3 to raise awareness of hunger in communities nationwide. Fenton staff members used the day to kick-off a year-long initiative to end hunger in our local community.

At the end of September, the first of several Northern Illinois Mobile Food Pantries came to Fenton to distribute food. The event was sponsored by Fenton's Applied Technology, Business, Family & Consumer Science and Art and Music Departments. Additional mobile food pantries are being sponsored and scheduled throughout the year.



At the September 28 Board of Education meeting, the Fenton Student Council presented a check for \$1,000 for the Bensenville / Wood Dale Food Pantry to help with the cost of purchasing a new truck to transport food. To raise additional funds throughout the community, the Fenton Swing Choir made donation cans that will be placed at local businesses during Homecoming Week. A Note from the Principal

Dear Fenton Families,

It is October and we have been in school for approximately four weeks. Our 2015 - 2016 enrollment numbers are set; thus, my article will focus on our student demographics. I believe this information will help parents and students understand and appreciate the student landscape that covers Fenton High School. In addition to student demographics, I will also share with you my thoughts in regards to equity.

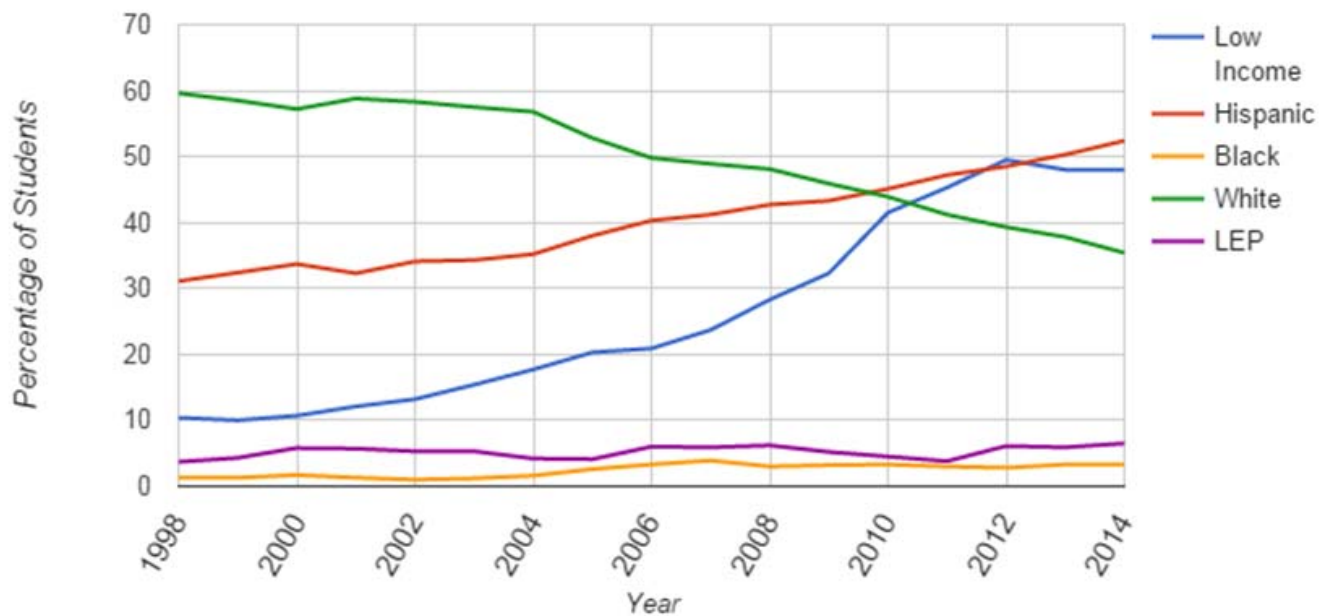
Currently, there are 1,479 students enrolled at Fenton High School. The majority of our students are Latino (57.3%) followed by white (31.7%), Asian/Pacific Islander (3.7), multiracial (3.1%), Black (2.7), and Native American (1%). In addition to race and ethnicities, 52% of our students are low income. That is one out of every two students. Low income is defined by the Illinois State Board of Education as a student who receives free or reduced school breakfast and lunch. Thirteen percent of our children receive special education services and 8.5% receive English as a Second Language and/or Bilingual services. See Chart 1 at right.

The number of low income students and families in our school has increased rapidly in the last fifteen years. See Chart 2 below. We have to make sure that all of our students are receiving the resources they need to be successful academically and socio-emotionally.

Fenton Demographics 1998-2014

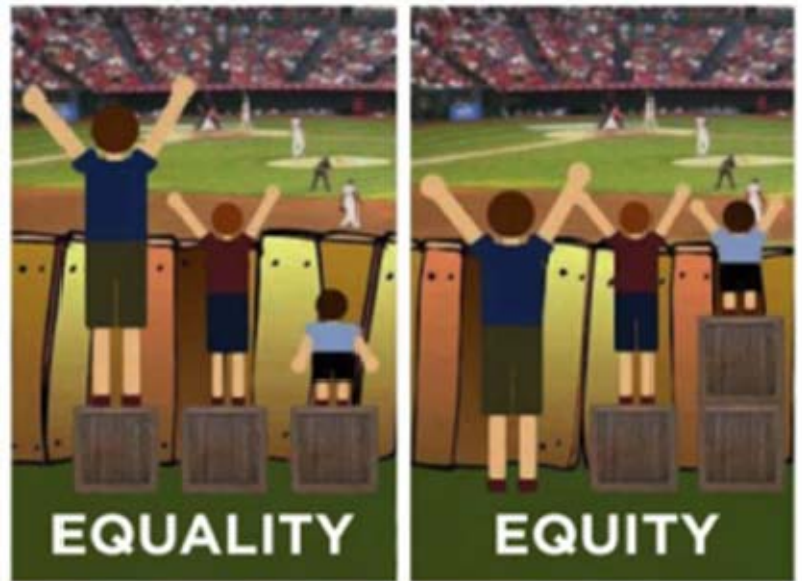


Fenton Board Member Receives Master Board Member Status

Some students need more interventions and resources than other students, which is okay because children have different academic needs. For many years, equality has been the norm in education. We treat all kids the same: student A receives the same as student B. Unfortunately, equality in education has not narrowed the achievement and access gaps. In recent years, the gap has widened. A better framework is equity. Equity looks at individual student needs. Equity means to accept children where they are academically and socio-emotionally and provide them with the resources they need to succeed. Equity is one of our focuses this academic school year. Our initiatives, 1:1, Literacy Across the Curriculum, Bison Time and Equal Opportunity School, fall in the equity framework. The equity diagram at the right provides a visual that explains Equality vs. Equity.



In closing, I hope you have a better understanding of our student demographic and equity, and I hope you have a better appreciation of our initiatives! Student success is our goal for all of our students.

College Corner

College Rankings and the Numbers that Matter

Welcome to the College Corner! Every month we will tackle a different topic related to college and career readiness. This month's topic is college rankings. Every September, *U.S. News and World Report* publishes a list of the years' "Best Colleges". Many factors determine the rankings such as acceptance rate, retention rate, percentage of students that are accepted that actually attend, as well as a fair amount of college politics. Students and families will often refer to this list in their college search and it is brought up in my office regularly. I always try to steer the conversation away from rankings. While certainly there are schools that have well respected programs and rankings often reflect that, what they cannot do is tell you if the school is a good fit for your son or daughter. So instead of focusing on the numbers in the rankings, I recommend looking at these numbers instead.

What is the middle 50% of accepted students' ACT and GPA? It is important that the majority of a student's application list is composed of schools that are a good academic fit and to which they would likely be accepted. Asking for the middle 50% instead of average ACT and GPA will give you a much better idea of where your student falls academically within the school.

What is the average class size? Often schools will list what their teacher to student ratio is. While this is good information, it does not tell you how large or small the average class is. This is important as some students learn better in a smaller class, while others will thrive in a lecture setting.

What is your freshman-sophomore retention rate? This number will tell you the percentage of students that returned for their sophomore year. It is a good indicator if students are happy with their choice and have the supports necessary to be successful, which makes them much less likely to transfer.

What is your four year graduation rate? Schools usually report their six year graduation rate. The goal should be to make sure that all students are graduating within four years. Ask this question to see how the school is doing at having students graduate on time.


What percentage of students have all financial need met? While all schools offer financial aid, some schools are able to provide more than others. In addition to asking this question, check out the Net Price Calculator on each school's website. It will give a good estimate of what that school will cost your family, which may be very different than the "sticker price".

These numbers are only a small part of the college search, but I think they will give you and your child much better information than any ranking ever could.

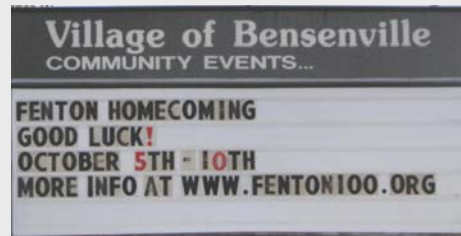

Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) Parent Connection

After focusing on career goals during the month of September, the SEL program now turns its focus to how our students' current actions can affect their long-term goals. This concept can be hard to grasp for teens, and psychologists have discovered a biological reason why. The teen brain has an immature frontal cortex, the area that controls decision-making and long-range planning. Until this part of the brain matures (around age 25), teens are more likely to act on impulse and less likely to consider the consequences of their actions. However, this doesn't "mean that young people can't make good decisions or tell the difference between right and wrong...or be held responsible for their actions. But an awareness of these differences can help parents and teachers understand, anticipate, and manage the behavior of adolescents" (American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry).

To assist our students and protect them from the potential negative consequences of their immaturity, we as parents and teachers can help educate them in certain areas. Two areas related to career goals include our students' internet presence and their high school grade point average (GPA). Sadly, some studies suggest that 20% of teen girls aged 13-16 have "electronically sent, or posted online, nude or semi-nude images of themselves" (National Campaign to Prevent Teen and Unplanned Pregnancy). Talking to both female and male teens about their presence online can prevent these kinds of behaviors; it is suggested that parents inform their children that anything they post online or send electronically will last forever, even if they attempt to delete it. College admissions officers and future employers are very savvy at finding such information.

Another area of teens' lives that will affect their future careers is their GPA. According to Peterson's, which provides career and college planning resources, "Many colleges set a 3.0 as a baseline for freshman and transfer admission, though they might still consider students with lower GPAs. What you need to realize is that nationally, maintaining a B average has become routine. As you climb up the college selectivity ladder, you will find colleges expecting the B as a minimum GPA, and then evaluating thousands of applications from students with B+, A-, and A averages." Teens need to be reminded of the future impact of their current study habits and decisions related to schoolwork, and sharing this type of information during a calm, non-confrontational conversation can be a great start.
