A Note from Principal Ongtengco

One of my favorite mantras is Less is More. Many districts fall into the trap of starting too many initiatives in a school year. I'm happy to say that we are going to limit the number of initiatives. Our curriculum and instruction focus for this year will be a continuation from last year. They are: 1:1 (one computer for every student), Bison Time (to provide students with additional academic support), Literacy Across the Curriculum (the ability to read, write, speak and listen effectively in varying contexts) and Danielson (teacher evaluation tool). One new initiative we are starting this year is Equal Opportunity School or EOS. In short, EOS is a means to try to identify and encourage qualified students to enroll in our Advanced Placement (AP) classes. See page six for additional information on EOS.

Last May, *The Comprehensive School Climate Inventory: Measuring the Climate for Learning* was administered. The inventory, as a measure, is intended to provide information about school climate as specifically measured by ten scales corresponding to ten important dimensions of school climate: Safety-Rules & Norms, Sense of Physical Security, Sense of Social Emotional Security, Support for Learning, Social & Civic Learning, Respect for Diversity, Social Support, School Connectedness/Engagement, and Physical Surroundings. For school personnel there are additional scales that are relevant to school climate - Leadership and Professional Relationships. At Fenton, 715 students, 104 personnel and 70 parents completed the inventory.

I am happy to report that we did not receive any negative ratings in our inventory from students, personnel and parents. The majority of our ratings are positive. Please review chart below. For students, they reported Neutral Ratings, which means there is room for improvement, in the areas of: Sense of Physical Security, Sense of Social Emotional Security, Support for Learning, Social and Civic Learning, Physical Surroundings and Social Media. For personnel, they reported Neutral Ratings in the areas of Sense of Social Emotional Security and Social Media. For parents, they reported Neutral Ratings in the areas of Sense of Social Emotional Security and Social Media. The two common scales that were rated neutral by all three groups were Sense of Social Emotional Security and Social Media. In conclusion, the administration will dig deeper into the inventory, create a committee, create action plans and work diligently to make Fenton the best school it can be.

Fenton Crest Receives an Update

The Fenton Community High School District 100 Board of Education in partnership with school administration is proud to unveil an updated version of the Fenton crest.

The Fenton Branding Committee, comprised of school board members and school administration, worked diligently to capture the tradition of the crest while modernizing the graphic. With the facility construction project in progress, it was time to revisit the crest, mascot and school colors. The District 100 Board was strongly in favor of keeping current school colors and the Bison mascot to maintain the strong tradition of Fenton High School.

The new Fenton crest has updated icons within the four chambers, a letter F and a ribbon distinguishing 1917 as the year Bensenville first began providing a high school program. The crest's four chambers mirror the mission, beliefs and vision of Fenton High School. See descriptions below.

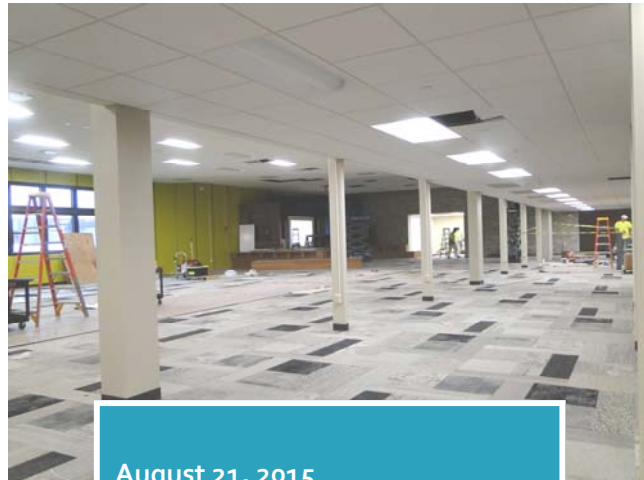
Construction Update

Several major elements of the Fenton construction project are nearing completion. The main hall has reopened with access to the new Health, Special Education and Guidance Offices. The reconfigured Student Service Center is also open; however, Door 1 will continue to be the temporary main entrance until January 2016. Visitors should enter the building using Door 1 and report to the Business Office to check-in.

Security remains our top priority. The construction site will be closed to student and staff traffic at all times with a fence. A wooden wall surrounds the construction site and construction workers have no contact with students. All construction workers have undergone background checks and wear identifiable credentials while working on the Fenton campus.

Equal Opportunity Schools (EOS) Project

Fenton High School has been selected as one of 120 schools to participate in the Equal Opportunity Schools Project. Fenton's acceptance was based in part by past success with the Advanced Placement (AP) program and commitment to ensuring that underrepresented students have equal access to rigorous high school courses. This is a matching fund grant program and Fenton will utilize Title 1 funds to pay their portion. The goal of the program is to increase enrollment in the AP program from underrepresented groups. The Equal Opportunity Schools Project will assist by:

- Evaluating the size, shape and causes of advanced course enrollment gaps at partner schools, as well as schools' strengths and their most effective options to close those gaps.
- Providing tools and guidance that principals can use to build stakeholder support for the ambitious, inspiring goal of finding every missing student within the current academic year.
- Identifying missing students and providing recruitment support using an innovative data and analytics system.
- Improving quality and achievement in the most rigorous classes by collaboratively building an achievement plan using tested pedagogical and support strategies.
- Working with leadership to incorporate strategies for finding missing students to sustain the gap closure after the end of the contract.

Equal Opportunity Schools is a non-profit organization with funding partnerships that include Google, Harvard University and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The Equal Opportunity Schools Project partnered with the Jack Cooke Foundation to help low-income and students of color reach advanced levels of academic achievement.

SEL Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) Parent Conn

Fenton's Social-Emotional Learning program exists to help students improve their emotional health, relationships and social skills. These competencies are key to academic achievement and personal well-being. During the month of September, the program will focus on making healthy lifestyle choices (including sleep, diet, exercise and time management) as well as academic goal-setting for the school year. According to the National Sleep Foundation, only 20 percent of teens get the doctor-recommended **nine hours** of sleep a night they need. Parents can help their teens by encouraging a reasonable bedtime and discouraging screen time late in the evenings, which studies have shown reduces the amount of deep sleep teens experience.

Additionally, to help your teen with the process of long-term goal setting, please visit www.whatsnextillinois.org, a website run by the Illinois Student Assistance Commission and available in both English and Spanish. Once registered, students can access career-planning tools to help with course selection and goal-setting in high school. Additionally, consider helping your teen set up a job shadowing appointment with someone working in his or her career of interest. While the summer offers the greatest opportunity for such experiences, school breaks and holidays are often good options as well.
